Letter from the Chair

Dear Shareholder,

2023 Annual General Meeting

The Annual General Meeting (the 'AGM') of Next 15 Group plc (the 'Company') will be held at our offices located at 60 Great Portland Street, London W1W 7RT, on 6 July 2023 at 11.00 a.m.

The Board values the opportunity to meet shareholders and respond to any questions you may have. Any changes to the AGM will be made available via our website at www.next15.com/investors.

We strongly encourage you to vote on all resolutions by completing an online proxy appointment form in advance of the meeting, appointing the Chair of the meeting as your proxy, whether or not you are ultimately able to attend in person. Details of how to do this are set out below.

For a detailed review of the year, please see our 2023 annual report at www.next15.com.

The formal notice of AGM, containing the resolutions to be considered at the AGM, is set out on pages 3 and 4 of this document (the 'Notice of AGM'), and this letter explains the resolutions more fully.

Resolutions 1 to 9 are ordinary resolutions requiring the approval of a simple majority of shareholders present in person or by proxy and voting at the AGM. Resolutions 10 to 12 are special resolutions requiring the approval of 75% of shareholders present in person or by proxy and voting at the AGM.

Dividend Reinvestment Plan

The Company operates a Dividend Reinvestment Plan ('DRIP') which enables shareholders in the UK to buy the Company's shares on the London Stock Exchange with their cash dividend. Further information about the DRIP is available from the Company's registrars, Link Group. If shareholders would like their future dividends to qualify for the DRIP, completed application forms must be returned to the registrar.

Action to be taken

The Company no longer posts proxy voting cards to shareholders to reduce our impact on the environment. In order to vote at the AGM, shareholders should use the electronic proxy appointment service offered by the Company's registrars, Link Group, at www.signalshares.com or via the registrar's app LinkVote+. The app is free to download via the Apple App store or Google Play and is compatible with smartphones and tablets. This represents a faster and more secure method of voting. You may need to register for the Share Portal Service if you have not already done so. All such votes must be received by 11.00 a.m. on 4 July 2023, being 48 hours prior to the time of the AGM. Although the Company will no longer be producing hard copy proxy forms, a paper copy may be requested by contacting Link Group on 0371 664 0300. Calls are charged at the standard geographic rate and will vary by provider. From overseas please call +44 (0)371 664 0300. Calls from outside the United Kingdom will be charged at the applicable international rate. Lines are open between 9.00 a.m. and 5.30 p.m. Monday to Friday excluding public holidays in England and Wales.

To register for the electronic proxy appointment service, you will need your Investor Code ('IVC') which can be found on your share certificates. Once registered, you will immediately be able to vote. Voting by proxy prior to the AGM does not affect your right to attend the AGM and vote in person, should you so wish.

Recommendation

The Directors believe that all of the resolutions to be proposed as set out in the Notice of AGM are in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders as a whole. Accordingly, the Directors unanimously recommend shareholders to vote in favour of the resolutions to be proposed at the AGM, as they intend to do so in respect of their own beneficial holdings. The Directors' beneficial holdings in aggregate amount to 5,455,431 shares, representing approximately 5.52% of the issued ordinary share capital in the Company as at 30 April 2023, the last practicable date prior to the publication of this document.

- (a) limited to the allotment of equity securities or sale of treasury shares up to a nominal amount of £246,953 (representing approximately 10% of the Company's issued share capital as at 30 April 2023), such authority to be used only for the purposes of financing (or refinancing, if the authority is to be used within 12 months after the original transaction) a transaction which the Directors determine to be an acquisition or specified capital investment of a kind contemplated by the Statement of Principles on Disapplying Pre-Emption Rights most recently published by the Pre-Emption Group prior to the date of this notice; and

Ordinary resolutions

1. Annual report and accounts

The business of the AGM will begin with a resolution to receive the Annual Report and Accounts for the year ended 31 January 2023 together with the reports of the Directors and Auditor which are available on our website at www.next15.com.

2. Directors' Remuneration Report

Shareholders are asked to approve the Directors' Remuneration Report for the year ended 31 January 2023, which is set out on pages 86 to 104 of the Annual Report and Accounts. This resolution is advisory in nature.

3. FY23 final dividend

This resolution seeks shareholder approval of the final dividend recommended by the Directors of 10.1p per Ordinary Share. If approved, the proposed final FY23 dividend timetable will be:

Record date:	7 July 2023
Last date for DRIP election:	21 July 2023
Payment date:	11 August 2023

4, 5, and 6. Election and re-election of Directors

The Company's Articles of Association provide that a Director appointed by the Board shall retire and offer themselves for election at the first AGM following their appointment and that, at each AGM of the Company, in addition to any new appointments during the year, one-third of the Directors must retire by rotation. At the forthcoming AGM, Paul Butler, having been appointed since the last AGM, will stand for election and Peter Harris, along with Robyn Perriss, will retire and being eligible, will offer themselves for re-election by the shareholders of the Company.

The Board is satisfied that the contributions of both Peter Harris and Robyn Perriss continue to be effective and both demonstrate sufficient time commitment to their respective roles. The Board also believes that each Director standing for re-election is independent in character and judgement. The Board was delighted to welcome Paul Butler to the Company, who brings with him significant experience, particularly in the US market, complementing the existing skills and expertise of the Board. The Board therefore recommends that the Company and its shareholders support the election and re-election of each of the Directors named above.

Biographical details of each Director standing for election and re-election can be found in appendix 2 of this document, on pages 68 and 69 of the Annual Report and Accounts and on our website at www.next15.com.

7. and 8. Reappointment of Auditor and authority to set its remuneration

At each general meeting where the Annual Report and Accounts for the Company is put to shareholders for approval, the Company is required to appoint an auditor to hold office until the conclusion of the next AGM and to seek authority from shareholders for the Board to set its remuneration. The Audit Committee has conducted a review of the Auditor's effectiveness and independence, including non-audit services provided during the year, and has recommended to the Board that Deloitte LLP be reappointed as the Company's Auditor. Deloitte LLP has also expressed its willingness to continue in its role as Auditor. Resolution 8 seeks to authorise the Audit Committee (for and on behalf of the Board of Directors) to determine the Auditor's remuneration.

9. Authority to allot shares

This resolution is to provide for the Directors to continue to have the authority to allot shares and grant rights to subscribe for, or convert any security into, shares. If passed, the resolution will authorise the Directors to allot: (i) in relation to a pre-emptive offer only, equity securities (as defined by section 560 of the CA 2006) up to a maximum nominal amount of £1,646,353 which represents approximately two-thirds of the Company's issued ordinary shares (excluding treasury shares) as at 30 April 2023, the last practicable date prior to the publication of this document. This maximum is reduced by the nominal amount of any Relevant Securities allotted under the authority set out in paragraph (b); and (ii) in any other case, relevant securities up to a maximum nominal amount of £823,176 which represents approximately one-third of the Company's issued ordinary shares

(excluding treasury shares) as at 30 April 2023, the last practicable date prior to the publication of this document. This maximum is reduced by the nominal amount of any equity securities allotted under the authority set out paragraph (a) in excess of £823,176. This limit is in line with the guidelines issued by the Investment Association.

The Directors have no present intention of exercising these authorities to allot shares and grant rights to subscribe for, or convert any security into, shares, except in connection with the Company's employee share schemes or as part of deferred considerations for recent acquisitions made by the Group. If granted, the authorities will expire at the conclusion of the Company's next AGM, or, if earlier, at 6.00 p.m. on 5 October 2024 (unless previously renewed, varied or revoked by the Company in general meeting).

Special resolutions

10. and 11. Disapplication of pre-emption rights

In November 2022, the Pre-Emption Group updated their Statement of Principles (the "Pre-Emption Group Principles") to, amongst other things, support companies seeking authority to issue non-pre-emptively for cash equity securities representing:

- no more than 10% of issued ordinary share capital whether or not in connection with an acquisition or specified capital investment (a general disapplication); and
- no more than an additional 10% of issued ordinary share capital, provided that it is intended to be used only in connection with the financing (or refinancing, if the authority is to be used within 12 months after the original transaction) of an acquisition or specified capital investment which is announced contemporaneously with the allotment or which has taken place in the preceding 12 month period and is disclosed in the announcement of the allotment.

Resolutions 10 and 11, will give the directors authority to allot shares in the capital of the Company (pursuant to the authority granted under Resolution 9) for cash without complying with the pre-emption rights in the Act in certain circumstances. The authority in Resolution 10 is limited to allotments or sales:

- in connection with an offer to acquire equity securities (in the case of the authorisation granted under resolution 9(a) by way of a fully pre-emptive offer rights issue only): (a) in favour of holders of Ordinary Shares in proportion (as nearly as practicable) to their existing holdings; and (b) to holders of other equity securities as required by the rights of those securities or as the Directors otherwise consider necessary;
 - (otherwise than pursuant to (i) above) up to a maximum nominal amount of £246,953 which represents approximately 10% of the Company's issued ordinary share capital (excluding treasury shares) as at 30 April 2023 (being the latest practicable date prior to the publication of this document);
 - (otherwise than pursuant to (i) and (ii) above) up to a nominal amount equal to 20% of any allotment under (ii) for the purposes of a follow-on offer of a kind contemplated by paragraph 3 of Part 2B of the Pre-Emption Group's Statement of Principles 2022.
- The authority in Resolution 11 is in addition to the authority in Resolution 10 and is limited to allotments or sales:
- up to a maximum nominal amount of £246,953 which represents approximately 10% of the Company's issued ordinary share capital (excluding treasury shares) as at 30 April 2023 (being the latest practicable date prior to the publication of this document) for use only in connection with an acquisition or specified capital investment which is announced contemporaneously with the issue or which has taken place in the preceding 12 month period and is disclosed in the announcement of the issue; and
 - (otherwise than pursuant to (iv) above) up to a nominal amount equal to 20% of any allotment under (iv) for the purposes of a follow-on offer of a kind contemplated by paragraph 3 of Part 2B of the Pre-Emption Group's Statement of Principles 2022.

Special resolutions continued

10. and 11. Disapplication of pre-emption rights continued

The Directors intend to adhere to the provisions in the Pre-Emption Group Principles, and not to allot shares for cash on a non-pre-emptive basis pursuant to the authority in Resolution 10 in excess of an amount equal to 10% of the total issued ordinary share capital of the Company (excluding treasury shares). Adherence to the Pre-Emption Group Principles would not preclude issuances under the authority sought under Resolution 11.

The Directors do not have any present intention to exercise this disapplication authority, however the Directors consider it is appropriate for them to seek the flexibility that this authority provides and that the authority sought in Resolutions 10 and 11 is in the best interests of the Company.

If granted, the power will expire at the conclusion of the Company's next AGM, or, if earlier, at 6.00 p.m. on 5 October 2024 (unless previously renewed, varied or revoked by the Company in general meeting).

12. Authorisation for the Company to purchase its own shares

It is proposed that, in common with many quoted companies, the Company be given authority to make market purchases of its own shares. This authority will be limited to a maximum of 9,878,116 shares, representing approximately 10% of the issued ordinary share capital of the Company as at 30 April 2023, the last practicable date prior to the publication of this document.

The Board will continue to monitor carefully the capital requirements of the Company and, although at present there are no plans to buy back shares, it may consider it prudent to act at short notice if circumstances warrant.

The Board will, however, make use of this authority only when satisfied that it would be in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders

as a whole and where the expected result of such purchase would be an increase in expected earnings per share. The Directors each confirm that they are not conflicted in their recommendation of the authority.

If granted, the authority will expire at the conclusion of the Company's next AGM, or, if earlier, at 6.00 p.m. on 5 October 2024 (unless previously renewed, varied or revoked by the Company in general meeting).

The maximum price (exclusive of expenses) per Ordinary Share which can be paid on any occasion is limited to an amount equal to the higher of: (i) 105% of the average of the middle market quotations, as derived from the London Stock Exchange's Daily Official List for the five business days immediately prior to the date on which the share is contracted to be purchased and (ii) the higher of the price of the last independent trade of an Ordinary Share and the highest current independent bid for an Ordinary Share on the trading venues where the purchase is carried out.

Ordinary shares purchased by the Company pursuant to this authority may be held in treasury, and may then be cancelled, either immediately or at some point in the future, resold for cash or transferred in connection with the Company's employee share plans. The Board will only hold shares purchased pursuant to this authority where it believes this course to be in the best interests of the Company and its shareholders as a whole.

The Directors have no present intention of exercising the authorities conferred by this resolution, but they consider it desirable that the authorities are in place so that they can more readily take advantage of possible opportunities.

A member entitled to attend and vote at the AGM is also entitled to appoint a proxy or proxies to attend, speak and vote in their stead. A member may appoint more than one proxy in relation to the meeting, provided that each

proxy is appointed to exercise the rights attached to a different share or shares held by that member. A proxy need not be a member of the Company. Appointment of a proxy will not preclude a member from attending and voting in person at the meeting.

The Company notes that international financial sanctions regimes, including those related to the ongoing situation in Ukraine, may constrain the ability of shareholders subject to such sanctions to exercise their rights attaching to their shares in the Company, including rights to vote at the AGM, and to have those votes recognised by the Company. The Company will continue to monitor this situation, and the Company's obligations to take into account the votes of its shareholders will at all times remain subject to compliance with all applicable law and regulation then in force.

If submitting proxy forms (together with any power of attorney or other authority, if any, under which they are signed or notarially certified or in some other way approved by the Board), these must be lodged by hand or courier only with the Company's registrars, Link Group, PXS1, Central Square, 29 Wellington Street, Leeds, LS1 4DL, not less than 48 hours before the meeting (or any adjourned meeting) (Saturdays, Sundays and public holidays excluded). Completion of your proxy form (submitted electronically or returned via post if a hard copy form is requested from Link Group) will not preclude you from attending and voting at the meeting in person should you wish to do so.

Unless otherwise indicated on the Form of Proxy, CREST, or any other electronic voting instruction, the proxy will vote as they think fit or, at their discretion or withhold from voting.

In the case of joint holders, the vote of the senior holder who tenders a vote shall be accepted to the exclusion of the votes of the other joint holders. Seniority shall be determined by the order in which the names of the holders stand in the Register of Members in respect of the joint holding.

To be entitled to attend and vote at the meeting (and for the purpose of the determination by the Company of the votes they may cast), members must be registered in the Register of Members of the Company at the close of business on 4 July 2023 (or, in the event of any adjournment, at the close of business on the date which is two days before the time of the adjourned meeting). Changes to entries on the Register of Members after the relevant deadline shall be disregarded in determining the rights of any person to attend and vote at the meeting.

3. Documents on display

Copies of the service contracts under which the Directors of the Company are employed by the Company or any of its subsidiaries or a memorandum of the terms of such service contracts) and copies of the letters of appointment of the Non-Executive Directors of the Company will be available for inspection at the registered office of the Company during normal business hours on any weekday (public holidays excepted) from the date of this Notice of AGM until the date of the meeting and will also be available for inspection at the place of the meeting for at least 15 minutes prior to such Meeting until its conclusion.

Each such representative may exercise (on behalf of the corporation) the same powers as the corporation could exercise if it were an individual shareholder, provided that (where there is more than one representative, and the vote is otherwise than on a show of hands) they do not do so in relation to the same shares.

7. Questions

Any shareholder, proxy or corporate representative attending the meeting on behalf of a shareholder, has the right to ask questions. The Company must cause to be answered any such questions relating to the business being dealt with at the meeting but no such answer need be given if a) to do so would interfere unduly with the preparation for the meeting or involve the disclosure of confidential information, b) the answer has already been given on the website in the form of an answer to a question, or c) it is undesirable in the interests of the Company or the good order of the meeting that the question be answered.
